Most of all, we want fun at the heart of everything we do and to develop a passion in our learners to discover their own voice.



Corseford School is a Capability Scotland specialist school, founded in 1956 for children and young people with complex and additional needs. We have an exciting and vibrant campus set near Johnstone where we provide education for children at both primary and secondary ages. We also provide a preschool toddler group and are home to Scotland's first-ever further education college for young adults with complex and additional needs. We are the school with real belonging.











The Corseford campus is located in Renfrewshire, Scotland. We are fortunate to be situated just outside of the historic towns of Elderslie and Johnstone, meaning we benefit from a school in the countryside with beautiful, green surroundings, animals nearby, and a quiet place to learn and explore but close enough to a major town that we can enjoy community life too.

We are proud to provide integrated learning through partnerships with our preschool and post-school centres, allowing our learners to enjoy working and socialising with young people of all ages. It is our experience that being surrounded by one's peers is not only empowering for our learners but also for their families and friends, removing some of the barriers young disabled people face whilst creating a community that celebrates success and promotes independence.

Our staff team includes teachers who specialise in educating children with complex and additional needs as well as a range of on-site allied health professionals. Education and therapy are supported by our expert social care practitioners who also ensure all personal care is dealt with.

Every member of these respective teams is employed directly by Capability Scotland which means the learners of Corseford School are their first and only priority - so parents and carers can rest assured their children are in the very best hands.


We believe that everyone should be as independent as possible in all aspects of their life.

- responsible citizens.


Our teaching is needs-led, skills-based, and

always tailored to our learners' needs through our Individualised Education Programmes. Learners come to Corseford because we offer a bespoke education supported by resources that grow and develop as they do.

Our curriculum framework has four principles that play an integral part in our daily learning. Our principles are:

- communication;
- skills for learning, life and work;
- health and well-being (resilience);
- responding to my environment.

Within a planned cycle of assessment, moderation and tracking, each learner will take part in high quality learning experiences throughout their individualised and tailored



learning journey. Our learning pathways provide a flexible framework for targeted work and learners may move between the pathways according to changing needs.

Learners will choose areas of study as they move from Broad General Education to Senior Phase and the level of certification achieved alongside social skills and well-being will impact onward positive destinations.

Our learning pathways are met by teaching through well-planned topics or themes matched to pupils' needs, interests and hobbies. We offer a wide range of SQA certifications, currently up to the National 2 level. Across all learning, we explore and develop abilities in communication, self-awareness and emotions, and motor skills.



We know that starting and leaving school is exciting but can also bring some uncertainties for families. We have services on either side of school age to ease these transitions for our young people.

Every week, we welcome toddlers between 0 and 4 to Corseford for our bespoke, childcentred Sunshine Tots Group. Our tots and their families come along to have fun, play, connect with other families and benefit from our onsite facilities and staff who provide advice for families, many of whom are new to having a disabled child and understanding what this means for them.

Our tots group is the perfect introduction to what an educational journey at Corseford School would offer, with a route to joining the School when they are ready to do so.

Our toddlers are valued members of our school community and are included in the exciting celebrations we have within the school. The toddlers thoroughly enjoy all the play opportunities and friendship-making, and it also provides a much-needed support network for their families.

The input of our physiotherapists has benefitted Lewis throughout his schooling but never more than following on from his different surgeries. His return to education was accelerated through intense therapy sessions, getting him back to a good level of fitness, ready to learn.

We are proud to host Scotland's firstever college for people with complex and additional needs on campus and our college is a perfect transition for young adults moving on from school, providing a familiar environment to continue in their education.

We provide a tailored further education programme at college for people between ages 18 and 25 encompassing buildingbased skills development, education, community access, and much more.

Facilities are shared across the campus so young people benefit from integrated learning from Tots, through to School and onward to College.

Our learning programme describes the motivating and engaging contexts in which students can develop and progress, enabling them to have enjoyable and fulfilling lives. It is personalised around each student with unique pathways and outcomes planned for each individual, based on their interests and stage in the learning journey.



Whether you are a young person attending our school, college or enjoying our free toddler group, you will receive excellent care and support from our expertly trained staff teams provided by Capability Scotland, our parent charity.

Capability Scotland has provided social care for the disabled people of Scotland for over 75 years and has a wealth of knowledge covering over 150 health conditions so there is little we have not seen or successfully supported.

Our staff meet the strict training requirements set out by the Care Inspectorate and the Scottish Social Services Council (SSSC). We support our young people throughout their day, from getting up and dressed for school, throughout the school day with lessons, after school for dinner, winding down for the evening, and everything in between.

We help with meal times and diet, personal care and maintaining dignity, calling home for a catch up, family visits, getting social with our friends and lots more.

We're there 24-hours a day, 365 days a year to ensure the young people in our care are receiving the very best care and support they need to achieve their goals and ambitions.

ADMISSIONS

Whilst we welcome privately funded learners, most pupils who attend Corseford School are funded by their Local Authority and as a result they are the primary decision makers on whether a learner is eligible to attend Corseford.

There is a five step admissions process to Corseford, this begins with your Local Authority reviewing whether we can support a learner, and the rationale as to why the learner should attend Corseford rather than their local authority school.

VISIT

We will welcome you for a visit, we can then explore our facilities together, to ensure that our school suits the young person's learning needs.

ASSESSMENT

Once suitability is agreed, our multidisciplinary team will carry out a robust assessment of the young person and provide an Assessment Report detailing how we will meet their education and therapy needs.

PLACING REQUEST

You will complete a Placing Request with your Local Authority, our Assessment Report will provide them with necessary information on suitability, your Educational Psychologist or Social Worker is well placed to help you.





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
